National Star College Presentation



Sophie, Ella and Andrew said 'hello' to the group.



Sophie does life skills and is working towards paid or voluntary work.

Life skills is learning out in the community.



Ella is in her third year at college.



Ella and Sophie are part of the Student Union.

The student union is one way the voice of students is heard and they help the college make choices.

Andrew is a member of staff who makes sure the student voice is heard at the National Star College.



Life Skills

Sophie said they go out and about in the community.



This could be to do some shopping or go bowling.



When they go out they ask for help from Staff if needed. They tell the staff what help they need.



Sophie does life skills for 4 hours a week.



Ella said in life skills they learn how to talk to people and tell them how they can help.



Ella told the group how she uses her AAC to talk to people. It is an electronic device that can speak out the words she wants to say.



She told the group what she might say if someone interrupts her.



Life skills is focused on what people can do.




Students spend lots of time in the community having fun.

Ella also went to the Houses of Parliament, as a Star College student.



Ella talked to Members of Parliament (MP's) about how they could give more help to young people leaving college.



Andrew said another student ran a campaign for Blue Badges to show if someone has a hidden disability.



Students have also helped clear the path near the canal.



Students at the National Star College work with students from the University of Gloucestershire.



National Star College students tell the university students what they think of things they have designed.

It is a bit like the TV show Dragons Den.



Students have also told the Department for Work and Pensions what they think about possible changes to Personal Independence Payment (PIP)

Sophie and Ella are both working towards employment.



Sophie works in the Star Bistro and the charity shop.



There are work coaches to help students.



There are lots of fundraising events.



Students often appear on TV. Ella was filmed by the BBC moving into her new flat.





Jan thanked the students and said we were lucky to have students leaving the college and being such an important part of Gloucestershire.



Vicci asked if the students were from Gloucestershire and, if not, how does Gloucestershire compare to where they grew up?



Ella is from Cardiff in Wales. She feels Gloucestershire has more for people with disabilities.



Sophie is from Cheltenham. She thinks Cheltenham is better than Gloucester for people with disabilities.



Ella feels there should be things for people with disabilities everywhere.



Rosie thanked Sophie and Ella and said it was the best talk she had been to all year.



Rosie asked what things they hope to see in Gloucestershire. What would help them?



Sophie said there should be more to do in the holidays



Ella said places and groups needed to be more accessible.

Jan said Barnwood Trust can give funding to improve accessibility.



Dan from Barnwood Trust said they have the Accessibility Fund.



Barnwood Trust are also working with green and blue space organisations around accessibility to nature.



Helen said if the students go out and get asked for ID a lot, Building Circles can help.

Jo said Changing Attitudes sits over all the priorities.




Deborah said she agreed with the priorities. She said advocacy also overlaps with all of them.

Inclusion Gloucestershire Talking Therapies Research Report




Vicci talked to the group about Inclusion Gloucestershire's Talking Therapies Research Report.



The report is attached to these notes.



This research was done because of what people said in Inclusion Gloucestershire's 2022 Big Survey.





They had used talking therapies in Gloucestershire in the last 5 years



There were 3 key issues:

1. Reasonable adjustments



2. Treating disability as important in therapy



3. Living with a disability



The report says how the people who pay for and run services can make them better for people with disabilities.



Jan said the Mental Health Partnership Board have said how upsetting it is when people are 'turned away' from therapy.



Karl said Integrated Care Board commission NHS to provide Talking Therapies.



Deborah asked: what is going to change from this research?






Vicci said that organisations like Guideposts have listened and are doing staff training because of this research.

Ruth asked if a set of standards could be written from this research.




Vicci agreed this would be a good idea.

Anything else to talk about and our next meeting




Helen from Building Circles told the group about Football Buddies.
