

Update on learning using a case study

LeDeR helps us learn about the lives and deaths of people with a Learning Disability or Autistic Adults. LeDeR wants to reduce the unfair differences in healthcare that can be prevented.

Marcus

Marcus was a kind and gentle person, who loved comedy and being with people. Marcus liked playing games, such as noughts and crosses and Connect 4. He always had pen and paper near him to help him communicate. Marcus had a moderate learning disability, type 2 diabetes and was blind in his left eye.

About death:

Marcus lived in supported living until May 2022 but because his was at risk of falling, he moved into a Nursing Home. He needed support for all parts of his life, including his diet and moving around.

In December 2023 Marcus choked during a meal at the nursing home. Staff tried to help him, and paramedics gave extra support. Marcus was taken to hospital to have oxygen.

Marcus' health was getting worse, and he had crackles in his chest. This is a sign of aspiration pneumonia, where food or drink gets into your lungs and can cause an infection.

He was given medicine, oxygen therapy and chest physiotherapy but he wasn't getting better. Marcus' ReSPECT plan was updated.

Marcus sadly passed away a few days later.

Good Practice:

- Great involvement from lots of different people and services.
- Use of best interest decisions following moving to a new home.
- Marcus was supported to live his best life. He had help to stay in contact with his family and his care staff used to show him of photographs of them.
- Marcus had a ReSPECT Plan and a Hospital Passport.

Learning (Positive):

- Marcus had help from lots of different community health services to stay healthy. It is good that Marcus got help before he became very unwell.

*Physiotherapy: Helps people who have problems with moving part or all of their body.

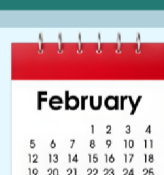
Aspiration Pneumonia



Food or drink going into your lung can cause an infection called Aspiration Pneumonia.



This is a cause of death for many people with a Learning Disability. Sometimes this can be avoided.

Please let people know 'autism only' reviews are part of LeDeR

Autism only reviews of people over the age of 18 has been part of the LeDeR process since January 2022. However, Gloucestershire LeDeR are yet to be told about the death of anyone who had 'autism only'.
